Glastonbury's industrial roots include the Royal Charter Market, founded in 1169 and still active on Tuesdays. Beckery Island, once home to tanneries, played a key role in the town's working heritage and is now being redeveloped for modern commerce.

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Landscapes

Surrounded by dramatic and peaceful landscapes, Glastonbury offers views from Wearyall Hill, Windmill Hill, and the Tor, across the Levels and Moors. Tranquil mountains amongst rare wildlife can be had at the Avalon Marshes Centre and RSPB Nature Reserves, while the ancient Oaks, Gog and Magog, whisper tales of Avalon's timeless natural beauty.

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Built Heritage

Glastonbury's designated conservation area forms the town's medieval heart, rich in historic buildings. The Tribunal offers a window into Tudor life and local legends, while the George and Pilgrims Inn is England's oldest purpose-built pilgrims' inn. The Georgian Town Hall adds a note of elegance to this historic centre.



Shopping, Restaurants & Cafes

Explore Glastonbury's vibrant local scene in the purple-shaded area of the map. Independent shops, eclectic boutiques, cosy cafes, and diverse restaurants reflect the town's creative spirit. Whether you're after hand-crafted goods, a hearty lunch, or something unique, this area is full of colour, flavour, and friendly character.



Religious Heritage

Glastonbury's spiritual story spans millennia. St Michael's Tower crowns the Tor, while the Abbey ruins still echo with legend. St John's and St Benedict's Churches stand in the town centre, and nearby St Bride's Mound is believed to be Britain's oldest monastic burial site. Glastonbury still welcomes pilgrims of all kinds.
